Contract Let By Village For New Reservoir Tank

Chicago Firm's \$34,375 Bid Low On 250,000-Gallon Steel Storage Unit

Contract to furnish and erect a new 250,000-gallon welded steel storage tank for use as a water reservoir here has been let by the village board of control to the Chicago Bridge and Iron company of Chicago, Ill. The contract was let last Thursday after a joint meeting of the board and members of the council to the lowest of three

of the board and members of the council, to the lowest of three bidders. The Chicago firm's offer was to provide the tank, erected on tubular structural steel legs, for \$34,375.

Other bidders were the W. E. Caldwell company of Louisville, Ky., \$37,500, and the Pittsburgh-DesMoines Construction company of Pittsburgh, Pa., \$38,800.


