After commenting that "everyone wants the President to succeed" in his budget cuts, U.S. Democratic Senator Howard Metzenbaum continued on to talk about tax abuses, loopholes, defense spending and the effects of the federal cutbacks on middle class Americans.

The senator arrived in St. Marys Saturday evening to speak at the Jefferson-Jackson Day Dinner hosted by county Democrats at the United Rubber Workers hall.

Metzenbaum said both Democrats and Republicans support President Ronald Reagn's efforts, but the "confirming evidence" is more available that the burden of the cutbacks will rest not only on the poor but also upon middle class America. He pointed to student loans and grants presently available to middle income families for college entrants as one issue. Also, student lunch programs will cost twice as much as a result, he said.

"I don't believe that it makes good sense just to slash the taxes," Metzenbaum said in referring to the President's income tax cuts proposal, since the spiraling rate of "inflation will continue on its merry way" and increase budget costs.

Those Americans earning less than \$10,000 income will share 50 percent greater of the total tax burden than they presently do," Metzenbaum claims. On the other hand, those earning over \$100,000 will pay 25 percent less of the total tax burden than they are currently paying, Metzenbaum continued.



He criticized the "failure of the administration . . . to bear down on the elimination of tax abuses and tax loopholes." A billion dollars picked up by eliminating tax abuses is as good as a billion dollars in cuts to food stamps, veterans program, senior citizens and "a host" of other programs, the senator explained.

Metzenbaum said he and Senator Barry Goldwater have submitted an eight-page letter to Casper Weinberger of the defense department about defense's "failure to use competitive bidding." Defense spending "costs overruns exceed seven billion dollars every year,"

The lifting of the grain embargo will help the farmers who produce wheat and corn and soybeans, "and I am extremely pleased for them. From that aspect I am very supportive of the President's actions," said the Senator. "But from the standpoint of our nations appearance in the community of the nations of the world, I think we again look very bad. We have been talking tough to the Soviet Union and now our actions are closer to a marshmallow. We are very soft. They have won this battle and they are needling us publicly about it and saying that they made us give in . . . and indeed they did," he said.

Senator Metzenbaum is a member of the Energy and Natural Resources Committee. He says the American consumer has been so gouged by the oil companies and

utility companies under existing laws,"That to even consider decontrolling natural gas at this time is horrendous. I led the filibuster against phased decontrol of natural gas under President Carter. But that filibuster that I would lead against total decontrol on the price of natural gas." said the Senator.

Decontrolling the price of natural gas would drive up the price about 100 percent according to the Senator. He says that is based upon figures from industry as well as outside sources. He added that the average person cannot tolerate higher fuel bills. "Although we promised those same people low income energy assistance, the administration has now indicated it's intent to cut those funds back further, notwithstanding the fact that the original contemplation was that 25 percent of the windfall profits taxes would be allocated to help people pay their energy bills."



> QUALITY POTTED · AZALEAS

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A joint meeting was held with the following 4-H Clubs, on Monday evening, the 27th of April in the Union Hall, Minster. The Clubs were: Minster Livestock, Stitch & Snack, of Minster; Ambitious Farmers of New Bremen; and Stitch In Time of St. Marys.

The topic of the meeting was a slide presentation given by Jeff Layman, Auglaize County Agricultural Agent, on his trip and stay in the Soviet Union, as a member of the YASEP program in 1978. The program (temporarily suspended because of hardening of relations with the Soviet Union) means Young Agricultural Specialist Exchange Program. Only 41 persons have ever gone to the Soviet Union with this program which is offered to persons who have a degree in agriculture with a background in 4-H (usually) and who meet rigid qualifications required by the program. When Jeff was chosen to take part in this exchange plan, he was sent to Washington D.C. for a 3-month crash course in Russian Language and Culture. The course would normally take two years to complete. At the end of the course, his group of 12 persons were ready to leave for Russia. They stayed in the Soviet Union for 3 months.

As an agriculture exchange Specialist, he spent his time studying Soviet methods of farming in the Byelorussia and Ukrainian areas. He found the growing seasons short and the equipment leaving much to be desired. Jeff was allowed to stay with a Russian family for a week and found them to be kind and generous.

He explained their 5-Year-Plan and its drawbacks.

He stated that the farmers live in homes clustered together and commute to the farms, reminiscent of the Fuedal days. Farms are specialized. He visited one farm that raised 11,000 bull a year for meat consumption. That farm used 26 silos to store the haylage needed to feed those bulls. He stated that the Soviets usually harvest the bulls at about 1,000 lbs., whereas the hog farm that he visited raised around 40,000 hogs yearly and would butcher them at around 300 lbs. A lot of 'fat back' was eaten by the Soviets.

The cattle found (mostly) in the Soviet Union are the Brindle (a Brown Swiss down breed), The Red Steppe, and the Chornie Billie (Phonetic sp.).

He worked on one commune during the harvest season where he was allowed to run a combine to harvest small grains. The grain was running around 42% moisture (we try for 15%) because it rained nearly every day. However, the grain was ripe and had to come off. This caused the combines to breakdown often, slowing the harvest even more. They used the straw for animal feed, too.

Jeff found the St. Basil Cathedral in Moscow to be quite colorful and impressive with its eight onion-shaped domes painted in vivid colors. The Red Square was also very impressive.

The Soviet government keeps before the people constant reminders of the 20,000,000 people that were lost in WW II, with monuments and shrines everywhere. Lenin's tomb is another great national shrine with millions of people passing through it every year.

The Americans were treated well by the Soviet government. Black (Africans) students followed the Americans around for two

reasons. They said they were hungry for news from the outside world and when the Americans came, it was the first time the plumbing really worked and they had hot water and it was the first time they were able to get good meat to eat. It was obvious that the Soviet Union was trying to impress the Americans. It was plain to see that the common





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
