Goldstein's Clothing Store Changes Hands

Goldstein's Department Store, a fixture in Celina since 1922, has been sold.

The new owners are David and Carolyn List, residents of Celina for 24 years.

David worked at New Idea in management and Carolyn has been employed in the Children's Shop in sales and purchasing for 15 years. Carolyn will be manager of the store.

Goldstein's Department Store opened its first store in St. Marys in 1916 but it wasn't until they moved to Celina in 1921, back to St. Marys for a year and then back to Celina in 1922 when they began to prosper.

The founder of the store was Barnett Goldstein along with daughters Harriette and Anne and sons Frank, Julius and Jack.

After leaving St. Marys, Goldstein's first located on Fayette Street in Celina in the old Brandt's Furniture Building. When they came to Celina the second time, they went into the building they occupy now.

At their new location on Main Street several improvements were made. They dug a basement under the store in 1935, where a shoe department was added. This de-

partment was run by Frank Goldstein.

In 1956 they rented the old Main Street Market and opened the Children's Store, run by Mrs. Frank Goldstein (Lillian) and Dan Schreiberman.

Still growing, the store took over the Style Shop Clothing Store on March 11, 1966 and did extensive remodeling. This added some badly needed floor space so they could serve their customers better.

The new owners will be concentrating on children's wear,

bridal and ladies' wear. They plan to continue some of the name brands now sold at the store and will be adding new fashion lines.

Several of the current employees will continue at the store and the List's daughter, Ann Link and daughter-in-law, Nancy List will join the staff.

David and Carolyn are the parents of three children and have four grandchildren.

List said they hoped to soon meet all the old customers of the store as well as welcome new ones.

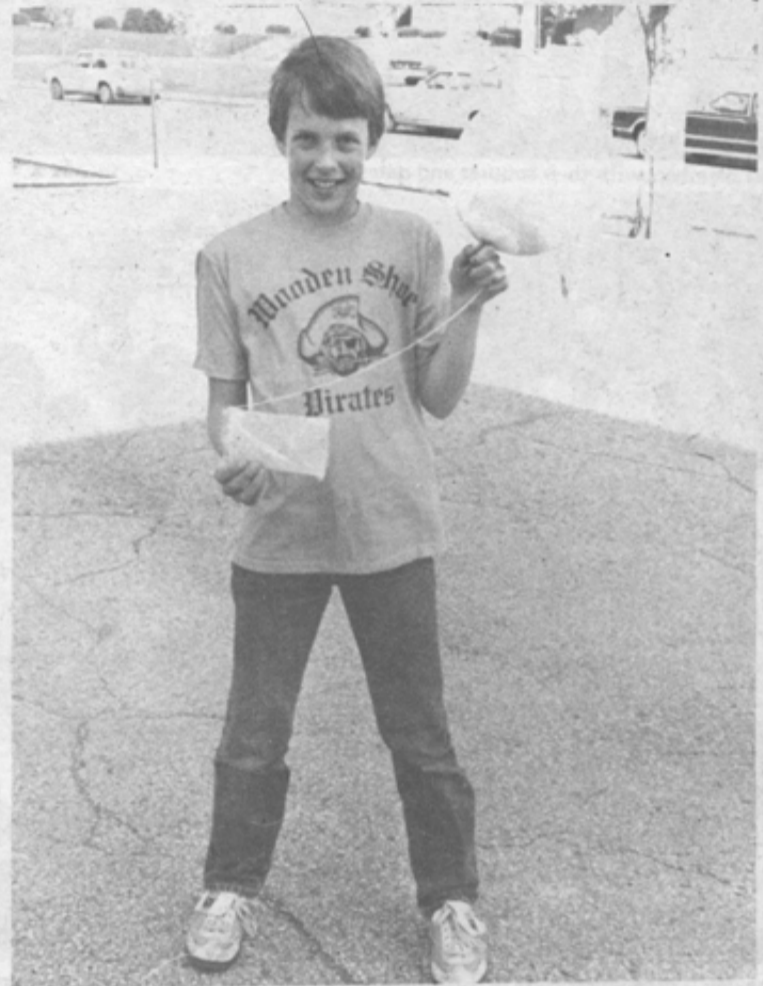

The short program, held in conjunction with National Volunteer Week, ended with the launching of clusters of colorful balloons which quickly gained altitude as they floated northeast above the business district.

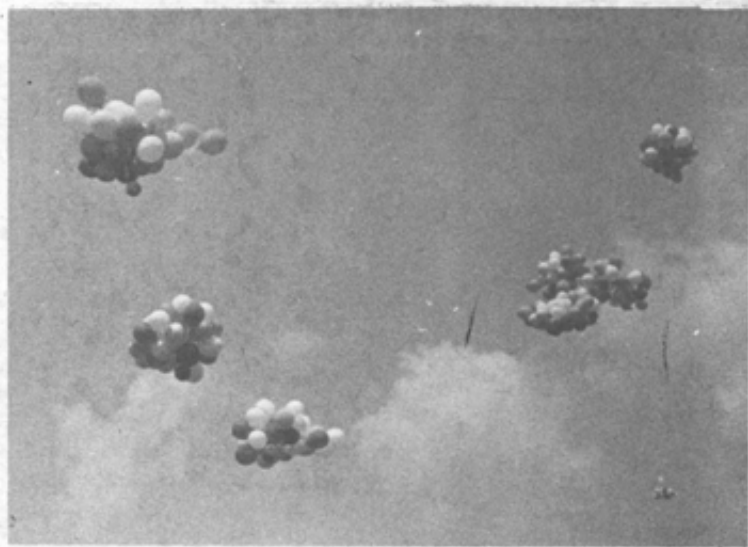

Letter To The Editor: The Money Illusion

Dear Editor:

The U.S. Constitution was written to protect "We, the People" from foreign invaders, from tyrants within our own government system, and to provide

Congress originally established gold and silver coins as the money of account of the U.S. and FIXED the dollar as the UNIT of the money of account as being a WEIGHT of gold or silver in coin forms. The dollar bills were merely RECEIPTS for the gold or silver coins; they served as CLAIM CHECKS. Certainly a claim check for money can not become the money itself anymore than a hat check can become a hat!

If "We, the People" become dependent on receiving something our public servants print or authorize, they cease to be servants and become our masters. In such a role, they will do ANYTHING to control us just as a Master controls a Slave! The distinction between "free men" and slaves is whether or not they are truly paid for their labor. If offered a choice, would you work for "printed paper" made from sticks of wood or would you prefer metallic coins made from precious metals?
