At the end of the year he summarizes and analyzes his project. He finds the total cost of production per pound or bushel and compares his record with those of other students. In this way efficienty of production is stressed and reasons for the results explained.

Small metal parts are then, added, after which the tank is "doped" and finally coated with silves cellulose paint.
